# **News on the Ninth**

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# **Nursery**



We have noticed that lots of plants are beginning to grow because it is spring. We have been learning about spring flowers and have learnt the names of some of them. We found lots of daffodils around the school. Some of them had flowered and some are still closed. We learnt that flowers have a stem, petals, and leaves.

# Reception



In Reception, we learnt about Chinese New Year and how it is celebrated. We enjoyed creating lucky red decorations and lanterns, finding out about Chinese letters and numerals as well as practising our own dances inspired by Lion dancing.

We used our fine motor skills to safely chop vegetables and cook a stir-fry. We tried using chopsticks to eat with and some of the children discovered new vegetables they liked!



#### Year 1



As part of our Geography topic the children in Year 1 went on a walk around the local area to look at physical and human features of the environment. The children had a wonderful time discussing the different

types of buildings enroute.



# Year 2

In Year 2 we have been very busy with our Geography learning where we are focusing on mapping our local environment. We went on a walk to survey the area surrounding our school where we looked out for both human and physical features. We will apply what we saw to our own maps of our local school environment.



We have also enjoyed many different activities during book week, and the children were very enthusiastic during our workshop based on our 3 O'clock book 'Charlie and the Chocolate factory'. Their knowledge of the story enabled the children to dive into different characters' personalities and create freeze frames of the story. Can you spot Charlie Bucket with his golden ticket?



Year 3 had a wonderful time during our visit from the



Science Dome! We explored the topic of light, through amazing displays and demonstrations inside the dome. We loved learning new facts about how we see light, how light can be changed and the effects of light.









For our World Book day workshop, we explored some of the events from our class book of Charlotte's web. We took the role of some of the main characters, including the animals, thinking about how we could represent their feelings and expressions in different situations.



#### Year 5



Year 5 spent a fun-filled day in the Orchard channelling our inner Bear Grylls! Throughout the day, we practised our whittling skills, tied a range of knots which we then used to support building strong shelters using natural resources (which we returned to nature afterwards).

We are continuing to practise our dance for the Campus West Dance Festival on March 27th, we look forward to sharing this with you.

## Year 6



In Science, we continued our unit of learning on Evolution and Inheritance. We learnt all about Charles Darwin and began to understand his theory of natural selection. In class, we conducted an investigation to see if we could prove Darwin's theory of natural selection by investigating which finch is best adapted to live on which island in the Galapagos Islands. We looked at different beak shapes and sizes (spoons, chopsticks and

cocktail sticks) and compared them with food sources available (raisins, seeds and marbles). We found out that different beak shapes can only eat certain foods.

In RE, we looked at the Christian belief in the Creation story and compared it with the world today. We designed a piece of art with two halves: one half depicted the story of the Garden of Eden up to the picking of the fruit whereas the second half showed the desecration of the Earth due to human involvement.





In Art, we developed our sketching and drawing skills when trying to recreate the Aztec sun dial. We have now begun designing our own Aztec mask, ready to make it out of clay in the next few weeks.

#### **Anti-Abuse Curriculum**

In order to embed the Anti-Abuse Curriculum into our teaching, each half term we are focusing on one theme which we will discuss in our classrooms during snack and discussion time. This half term, we are focusing on **Keeping safe, knowing what is not okay and restoring safety.** Some objectives link closely with our PSHE topics as well as our discussion on the Emotion of the Month. Here are just some of the things we have been discussing across the school:

- I know why it is important to follow instructions and routines.
- I understand that I should tell an adult if I see someone being unkind.
- I know that everyone has the right to feel safe and that people who feel unsafe need to access support.
- I know that racism is commenting on, being unkind to someone or treating them unfairly based on how they look or what they believe.
- I know that doing nothing is a negative step when someone is being hurt, including myself, and that there are always positive steps I can take.
- I know how to say no when I want someone to stop hurtful or upsetting behaviour toward me and others.

At home, why not speak with your child about which adults they trust to speak to when they need support (refer to Helping Hands). Reinforce the teaching of what racism is and that it is never acceptable to treat somebody unfairly based on how they look.

### **Online Safety**

March's Online Safety focus is 'Privacy and Security'. At home, please could you have a discussion with your child regarding this area.

In EYFS and KS1, it could be discussing what is 'private' information and 'adults they can trust'.



In Lower KS2, discussions about keeping passwords to themselves and types of private information which they should not share online.

In Upper KS2, discussing what to do if they think passwords are not secure and 'seeking' consent when popups / terms and conditions appear.

April's theme is 'Copyright and Ownership'.

In **EYFS** and **KS1**, discussions can be about work you produce belongs to you and other people's work belongs to them.

In Lower KS2, understanding that you can't always copy things of the internet and you need to think whether you have the right to reuse it.

In **Upper KS2**, give examples of content that is permitted to be reused and know how this content can be found, along with how to make references to acknowledge sources used from the internet.

### **Leading Parent Partnership Award**

In our January newsletter, we let you know that we are working towards a parent partnership award, and many of you had taken part in an online survey in December to give your views. A parent working party has added valuable information and you received a letter in January outlining forms of school communication and our ongoing plan to slim these down. Thank you for your positive feedback on this.

Part of the December survey asked parents if you know what your children are learning at school, if you know how your children are doing at school and if you know how to help at home. Since then, we have created curriculum leaflets, which were distributed at parent consultations, to show your child's full curriculum across the term. We will continue to provide these in forthcoming terms. Our mini-survey to check in with you at parent consultations showed that 100% of parents now feel they know this information.

Another part of the December survey asked about policies. The vast majority of the 53 comments given about policies let us know that you know they are on the website and can find them easily. You also commented that if clarification is needed, the school office is happy to help. Most of our policies are Hertfordshire model policies, which we adopt as a maintained school. This means we have little say over the content and wording. Parents are given an opportunity to comment on policies written in-house via parent forums. These have included policies such as Religious Education, Special Needs, Sex and Relationships and Preventing and Dealing with Racist Incidents policies. If you are interested in having your say on school policies, please keep your eye on diary dates for future forum meetings.

This half term, we will be learning about 'sadness': how it feels, what causes it and how it might look in someone else.



Please discuss this emotion with your child at home.

An important point for children to understand is that all emotions are temporary. They will not remain forever.

Talking to someone about how you feel and sharing your feelings, can help you to feel happy again. By exploring the reason that you feel sad and making a plan to deal with the source of your sadness can help you to feel more positive. Sometimes, sadness will be covering another emotion too.

# **Reading books**

All our reading books on the school book shelves are carefully selected to be age appropriate and in accordance with reading recommendations. We ask that children only read school reading books while they are in school to ensure they get a suitable diet of grammar, punctuation, style and structure in the texts they read. Every classroom has a library with a good selection, and these are replenished and updated continuously. Books that you buy for your children outside school are obviously to be encouraged to motivate readers and form personal preferences, but these often contain American spellings and written structures not suitable for children to be adopting in their own writing. This is why we ask for school books to be read in school and other books to be read at home. Thank you for supporting this.

#### **Polite Reminders**

Please ensure that all emails to the school are sent to the admin email address admin@scommonswood.herts.sch.uk

**Smoking** - it is against the law to smoke on any part of the school site, so please avoid doing so here or in the immediate vicinity of our gates where young children can suffer harm from passive smoking.

**Dogs** – are not permitted on the school site. Please do not tie dogs up outside the school gates as barking dogs can frighten children.

**Cycles /scooters** - please dismount before entering the school site and leave cycles and scooters securely in the bike sheds. Electric scooters are not permitted on site.

One way system - a voluntary one way traffic system operates in the Commons at the start and end of the school day. If possible, please avoid bringing vehicles into the Commons but if this is essential please keep the school on your left.

**Photos** - it is not possible to take photographs on the school site whether inside or outside the buildings. This is designed to protect the small number of families affected by domestic violence or child protection concerns. This includes the use of mobile phones which are prohibited on site.

It is parents' responsibility to look after children while on site. Please keep young children with you. They are not permitted to be on the play equipment. Children are not permitted to play on the main entrance railings or climb any fences.

#### Term time holidays

We are unable to authorise term time holidays. Absence can only be authorised if a child is unwell. If however, the number of unauthorised sessions reaches 15 or more within 2 terms, the local authority may issue you with a Penalty Notice. The Penalty Notice requires parents to pay a fine of £60 within 21 days. If this is not paid within the time limit, the penalty rises to £120 which must be paid within 28 days.

Term time holidays have a negative impact on friendships and learning. Please avoid taking your child out of school. Term time holidays are not authorised. Absence requests can only be authorised is there are exceptional, unrepeatable circumstances. Section 7 Education Act 1996 places a duty on parents to ensure that their child of compulsory age attends school.
