Online Safety Theme – Privacy and Security

- In Upper KS2, discussing what to do if they think passwords are not secure and 'seeking' consent when popups / terms and conditions appear.

What a fantastic week filled with creativity, imagination, and a love of reading!














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Nursery

Reception

Year 2


In our Computing lessons, Year 2 have been very busy creating algorithms for Beebots. The children developed a set of directional instructions to help their Beebots move around the map and land at different locations. This task was made trickier by obstacles! 





Year 4

In Year 4 Maple, we have been working hard to improve our reasoning and explaining skills. In English, we're learning how to add more detail to our answers in reading comprehension. In Maths, we've been explaining how to add fractions and solve problems.

Our new book, Leon and the Place Between, has sparked our imagination, and we're focusing on adding exciting dialogue to our narratives. This week, we started the Archbishop of York Young Leaders Award, and we're looking forward to sharing our learning in the Year 4 Assembly on 26th March.







We are also continuing to practise our dance for the Campus West Dance Festival on 19th March, and we look forward to sharing our performance with you!

Year 6

In Science, we have started learning about the circulatory system. We have identified and named the main parts of the human circulatory system and described the functions of the heart, blood vessels, and blood. Next, we will explore how our diet and lifestyle choices can affect our heart health.

In RE, we are studying the Christian belief in the Creation story and comparing it with the world today. We are designing a piece of art with two halves: one half depicts the story of the

Garden of Eden, up to the picking of the fruit, while the other half shows the desecration of the Earth due to human involvement.

Emotion of the half term

Sadness

This half term, we will be learning about 'sadness': how it feels, what causes it and how it might look in someone else.

Please discuss this emotion with your child at home.

An important point for children to understand is that all emotions are temporary. They will not remain forever.

Talking to someone about how you feel and sharing your feelings, will help you to feel happy again. Exploring the reason you feel sad and making a plan to deal with the source of the sadness can also help you to feel more positive.

Sometimes, sadness will be covering another emotion too.

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Anti Abuse Curriculum – Keeping Safe

To embed the Anti-Abuse Curriculum into our teaching, we focus on one key theme each half term, which we discuss during Snack and Discussion time in our classrooms.

This half term, we are concentrating on *Keeping Safe*, understanding what is not okay, and restoring safety. These objectives closely link with our PSHE topics and our discussions on the Emotion of the Month. Here are just some of the things we have been discussing across the school:

- I know why it is important to follow instructions and routines.
- I understand that I should tell an adult if I see someone being unkind.
- I know that everyone has the right to feel safe and that people who feel unsafe need to access support.
- I know that racism is commenting on, being unkind to someone or treating them unfairly based on how they look.
- I know that doing nothing is a negative step when someone is being hurt, including myself, and that there are always positive steps I can take.
- I know how to say no when I want someone to stop hurtful or upsetting behaviour toward me and others.

At home, why not speak with your child about which adults they trust to speak to when they need support (refer to Helping Hands). Reinforce the teaching of what racism is and that it is never acceptable to treat somebody unfairly based on how they look.

Art -

This half term, we have been exploring the iconic art deco sculpture Christ the Redeemer. We discussed what we already knew about the sculpture, what we liked and disliked about it, and examined the details, the mood it creates, and any questions it raised.

Children will have the opportunity to revisit this piece in class.

Please take some time to discuss it with your child at home as well!
